Activities to do Before Reading

Activity 1

Predict the main point

- a) Write the name of the article, *The mother who was overlooked: The true inspiration behind the political ideals and acumen of Aung San Suu Kyi*, on the board. Students look up any words they don't understand in their dictionaries. Elicit students' explanations and/or translations of this title.
- **b)** Draw students' attention to the pictures in the article, but make sure they don't read it yet. Individually, or in pairs or groups, students decide what is the main point of this article. Write their ideas on the board.

Activity 2

What do you know? What do you think you know? What do you want to know?

Tell students they are going to read an article about Daw Aung San Suu Kyi's mother, Daw Khin Kyi. What do students know about her?

- *Things they know* are facts that they are quite sure about (e.g. Daw Khin Kyi was Aung San's wife).
- Things they think they know are things they are unsure of.
- Things they want to know are things they are interested in finding out.

In groups, pairs, or individually, students fill in the chart.

There are no right or wrong answers in this activity.

Activities to do During Reading

Activity 3

Check the main point

Give students 5 minutes to skim-read the article. Check through the main point suggestions from **Activity 1.** Students decide which suggestions are the main point.

Activity 7

Activities to do After Reading

Activity 8

Research and planning a biography

For this activity, students have to use their imaginations, and pretend that they are researchers, who can travel freely and have a large research budget.

a) The writer of this article suggests that Aung San Suu Kyi should write a biography of her mother. If Aung San Suu Kyi does not have enough time to do this, she might ask you to do the job. Where could you get information about her? There are a few sources mentioned in the article. In groups, think of a list of sources, people and places you could go to find out more about Daw Khin Kyi.

Suggestions:

- The three sources mentioned in the article: Tin Moe, Ma Than E and Dagon Tava
- Other people who met her
- India the Burmese embassy might have records of her, also there may be people there who remember her
- Libraries
- Books about Aung San and Aung San Suu Kyi
- Old magazine articles about Aung San and Aung San Suu Kyi
- Burmese or Indian magazines might have articles about Daw Khin Kyi
- Britain there might be old colonial records about Daw Khin Kyi
- **b)** The publishers have decided the book must be 12 chapters long. Students decide what chapters they would divide the book into. In their groups, they decide on a title for each chapter. You might like to brainstorm a few examples on the board, or give some of these examples:

Chapter 1: Khin Kyi's parents

Chapter 2: Her childhood

Chapter 3: The student nurse

Chapter 4: Busy days as a nurse

Chapter 5: World War Two breaks out

etc.
